The Fashion Show will present traditional clothing and dance regalia worn by tribal members, today's fashions with American Indian jewelry and accessories worn by local Washingtonians and patrons of the Shop and . . . the very latest in designs by American Indian designers worn by local models and patrons.

There will be many special guest designers and artists on October 20th and 21st. The following will be present with clothing selections: Virginia Yazzie Ballenger (Navajo), Marian "Spotted Wings" Hansson (Kiowa), Kathy "Elk Woman" Whitman (Mandan, Hidatsa & Arikara) and Red Nations Art. Other designers represented are: Betty David (Spokane), Ardina Moore (Quapaw/Osage), Virgil Ortiz (Cochiti), Patta (Choctaw), Margaret Roach Wheeler (Chickasaw) and Wendell Sakiestewa (Hopi). Clothing will be available throughout the exhibition. The jewelers who will be present include: Michael "NaNa Ping" Garcia (Pascua Yaqui); Terrill O'Brien (Mohawk), Charlene & Frank Reano (Santo Domingo); Kathy "Elk Woman" Whitman (Mandan, Hidatsa, Arikara) and Gloria Yellowhorse (Navajo).

Christie Findlay, Senior Editor of DC Style Magazine will emcee the Fashion Show. Following the show, guests can meet the talented designers at The Indian Craft Shop, where many of the featured items will be available for sale until October 27. This collection augments the Shop's regular assortment of American Indian arts and crafts from all over the United States, giving it a true niche within the DC marketplace.
